Changing places (section 4)

Context

Saltaire and Manningham both started out as purpose built residences for the workers in the mills run by Titus Salt and Samuel Lister (respectively). Today, they are very different in terms of employment, health and demographics. This case study invites a detailed investigation of the reasons for their very different directions, through analysis of census data, surveying and the media.

Lesson Idea:

These lessons are intended to take place over several sessions. The resource pack guides students through field trips

to each locality. While there, students are to record indicators of the affluence of the area and the population demographics, while also surveying local people to gain an understanding of how residents view the area.

The second stage, using the Saltaire 2001-2011 graphs, involves using the census data from these two years to investigate how Saltaire has changed in that decade.

This is followed by a discussion of Saltaire's World Heritage status and how this has benefitted and, possibly, harmed the village's progress. Two news articles are provided on proposed developments close to Saltaire that were fiercely opposed. Students are invited to form their own conclusion as to whether World Heritage status has been a good thing for Saltaire.

Finally, students are provided a longer, essay-style question to discuss the similarities and differences between Saltaire and Manningham, using their work so far and the Saltaire - Manningham comparison graphs.
